FAMILY TRAGEDY

It is with the deepest regret that I have to record the death of my only son, William Alaric, who was killed at the age of 39, in a motorway accident on the evening of Monday 18th September 2006.

He was completing the move from his house in Walsden, Todmorden, to set up home with his fiancée of two years, Lisa Dootson, in Westhoughton, Bolton. Carrying the last load of furniture and personal belongings in his LDV van he was killed instantly when an articulated lorry travelling in the opposite direction on the M61 motorway jack-knifed and came over the central reservation. Although two other cars crashed into the truck, Will was the only fatality.

However as we got involved with trying to wind up his affairs I realized that this was just as much a part of our family history as my recordings of other events.

If you feel that I have been too self indulgent in including details and facts about which you do not wish to know, I apologize in advance, and trust that you will just accept an appreciably smaller issue than usual. I hope also that you will excuse the fact that some of the information is odd and disjointed. I have done my best.

Another ruined Life.

As I said on page 2 Will was on his way to the new house in Westhoughton that he was sharing with his fiancée of two years, Lisa Dootson. I think her story was best told in the **'Bolton News'** of Saturday 23rd September in the article I reproduce here.

Fiancee of tragic M-way victim tells of heartbreak

THE fiancee of a man killed in a horror motorway smash told today of the life they had been planning together.

William Colloff, aged 39, was killed when his car was in an accident with a lorry on the M61 earlier this week.

He had been preparing to move into a new home in Westhoughton with Lisa Dootson.

Mrs Dootson said today: "My life has been torn apart. He was my future and I loved him so much. He was such a warm and caring person.

"Our life together was only just beginning, and now it has been taken away."

Mr Colloff was originally from Todmorden in Yorkshire, but had bought a new home in Green Meadows,

Westhoughton, four weeks ago and was in the process of decorating it.

He met Mrs Dootson, who is separated, two-and-a-half years ago in the Red Lion Hotel, Westhoughton, through a mutual friend. They got engaged less than a year later on Mrs Dootson's birthday. Mr Colloff, a financial adviser, was on his way to see his fiancee on Monday when the accident happened. He had called her at 5.15pm to say he

was on his way and should not be too long.

But when a few hours passed and he had not arrived she began to panic. She heard there was an accident on the M61 and phoned around hospitals to see if he had been admitted.

Mrs Dootson, aged 37, said: "He hadn't, but I still couldn't settle, so we went out to the motorway to look for him. A police officer told us to go home. About 30 minutes after we got in, the police were on the doorstep to break the news. I was devastated.

"He was really witty, often making jokes and taking the mick out of people.

"I'm going to miss him so much, even though we were not together very long.

"You don't realise how short life is until something awful like this happens.

"We were planning on going away to Los Angeles or Bangkok in January for his 40th birthday. But now all I have left are photographs and memories."

Mr Colloff was a devoted father to his son, Jack, aged 11. Mrs Dootson has three children, Warren, aged 20, Stephen, aged 16, and Nicola, aged 13.

An Appreciation

William Alaric Colloff,

1st January 196+-7 to 18th September 2006.

Will eschewed an academic career, leaving school at 16, and worked his way through various jobs including YTS schemes, supermarket shelf stacking, van driving for market traders and selling sports goods. Eventually he ended running his own mortgage brokering business having got there via selling insurance and mortgages with Allied Dunbar and then Wesleyan Insurance.

Many of his early days with the last two companies were spent out on the road, driving small leased under-powered 'reps' cars and this left him with a great dislike of such vehicles. He also disliked the futility of turning out early on Monday mornings, when nobody wanted to see business representatives, although this was something on which such employers insisted.

Accordingly, when he and a colleague Peter Lucas, set up their Company '**Finance Assured**' one of their aims was to avoid both. So to start with their cars were bigger and as the company flourished they became more luxurious, and despite working evenings and weekends, they did not start until mid-day on Mondays and finished at mid-day on Fridays.

The business flourished and by 2001 it was able to provide them each with a new Mercedes sports car.


Will made a great success of the business and in 2004 he bought Peter Lucas out of the business and become Managing Director. At the time of his death there were at least five other people working for '*Finance Assured*'. Their efforts left him making an excellent living and free to work on property developing for himself and to buy a half share on a holiday apartment in Spain for the school holidays with his son, Jack Alaric.

All this came to an abrupt end with the crash in the van Will used for his property development and taking furniture to Spain. He had not quite manged to drive 500 miles in his latest £65,000 threeweeks old Mercedes 300 SL, seen in one of the last pictures taken of him below.

These two properties, are numbers 91 and 93 Charlotte Street which runs near and parallel with Tottenham Court Road, London.

It is an area that was known as "Little Germany".

According to their 1913 marriage certificate; 91 on the left, is where Otto Colloff (1888-1977) lived, and 93 is where Anna Luthi (1885-1978) lived, before they were married.

In Volume I, Issue 1 there was a photo of their memorial stone in Schaufffhausen, Switzerland, that Roy's sister literally tripped over when visiting her father-in-law's grave.

The Swiss authorities told me that Otto was German and Anna Swiss and they lived for many years in Schaufffhausen, where they both died.


Roy's 80th.
